



Master's Degree Programme in **International Human Rights Law**

The Programme

The Master's Degree Programme in International Human Rights law is designed to prepare its graduates for challenging human rights careers in international organizations, non-governmental organizations and public administration. It will also provide the essential background for advanced human rights law research. Successful completion of this two-year full-time programme results in the award of a Master of Social Sciences (M. Soc. Sc.) degree. The programme was launched in 2006. The Programme Director is Ms. Catarina Krause (Deputy Director of the Institute for Human Rights).

Structure of the Programme

The programme consists of the following modules: (a) compulsory human rights law courses (85 credits), including a research seminar and a master's thesis in international human rights law; (b) compulsory language studies, and; (c) optional courses, which may include courses offered by the three universities in Turku / Åbo within Turku Law School as well as courses offered by Nordic and international partner universities.

Admission requirements

Participation is limited to 15 persons. The programme is open to those holding a law degree or another bachelor's degree with at least 45 credits / ECTS in law or other relevant subject(s). The Programme is offered by the Institute for Human Rights and the Department of Law at Åbo Akademi University. In its teaching the Institute relies upon its own researchers, the faculty of the department of law as well as international experts, including its former Directors Dr Allan Rosas, Judge of the European Court of Justice, and Professor Martin Scheinin, UN Special Rapporteur on Human Rights and Counter-Terrorism and former member of the UN Human Rights Committee.
